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

We are entering the season of Advent. It is an invitation for all of us to 'recognise the visitation from God as we prepare ourselves for the solemnity of Christmas. The Lord visits each one of us with his graces at different times of the liturgical season. We have to know the time of His visitation. "When the time had fully come, God sent his Son, born of a woman ... so that we might

receive adoption as sons" (Gal. 4:4-5). Advent is not only the celebration of God's coming to us

but also, of our coming to him. Advent is a time of preparation - a time of hope, prayer, and time to seek out God's will.

During Advent, we are hopeful of His second coming. We rejoice that we are remembered by God. St. John Paul II pleads to us Christians: "Never, ever give up on hope, never doubt, never tire, and never become discouraged. Be not afraid." Mother Mazzarello urges us to develop a spirit of union with God in her letter. "As far as you can, always preserve a spirit of union with God, remain always in His



presence. Be very careful to give good example and to do things with the sole aim of pleasing God" (I will never forget you: Letter No.23). And so, let us prepare, like never before, to receive the joy, peace and love of our Lord Jesus Christ at the commemoration of His birth.
